The Science department are looking forward to a great 2020 with all of our wonderful science students at TLSC TEC.

2020 is the second time that our teachers will be teaching the new Science Syllabi. The increased rigour of these new courses can be challenging, and we are looking forward to implementing all that we (both teachers and students) have learnt from the 2019 HSC exams and using them as a guide as to what to expect in 2020.

For Year 12, we know that the HSC year can be quite stressful for students (and parents too), and we wanted to make sure that parents know that there is ALWAYS study/homework to be completed even if specific coursework hasn't been set for homework on that day. All students have access to an electronic version of the textbook. Our Science students also have access to EDROLO for most of our science courses and this video tutorial website will help students make study notes and also includes exam questions as well. The course teachers will be compiling practice HSC questions based on the content taught, and students are also expected to create their own 'dotpoint' summaries for every individual content outcome within the syllabus. We are lucky enough to have received a powerful telescope last year with autoguiding and remote software and we are looking forward to hosting Astronomy events welcoming our students and their families.

Attendance is important at all Science classes. If students aren't present they aren't learning, which can become a problem if the absences build up. I urge all students to speak to their course teachers if they are going to be away in order to get work to complete. If students do have absences it is essential that they catch up on work missed.

I urge all parents to feel free to get in contact with your child's teachers if you would like to discuss your child's progress, advice for revision/ study or any part of what they are learning in Science, as we believe that the students' education is a partnership between teachers, parents and of course the student as well. Maintaining an open line of communication will allow all of us to achieve the very best outcomes for all of our science students at TLSC TEC.







Course Costs

(CONSUMABLES) - Course Fees

All VET course fees are due in Term 1. They are necessary for your child's courses in order to purchase the materials they will need to work on during their VET course in 2020. They can be paid in instalments each term. Please speak to your child's VET teacher if you need some support to pay these fees.



ALL STUDENTS MUST supply their USI to their VET teacher in order for NESA to issue your credentials when you leave school.

USI refers to 'Unique Student Identifier'.

This is a 10 character code that is issued to you after you have gone through the process of application.

- The Unique Student Identifier is a national registry that allows all students undertaking vocational courses to **track** the **competencies** that they have **achieved**.
- This is an Australian Government initiative.

Work Placement – Many of our Year 12 students are commencing their Year 12 mandatory week of work placement. Not sure if your child has to do work placement? Give their teacher a call or send them an email.

LEARNING ENRICHMENT

Year 11 Helpers needed

Each year our department require a bank of Year 11 writers that are able to assist us during Year 12's assessment tasks and major examinations. The writers gain valuable test taking skills whilst also supporting our Year 12 students to access the exam paper. Students are often unable to write in their exams due to injury or disability. This voluntary activity is documented on a student's reference letter when they graduate Year 12. Please see Mrs Brown in Learning Enrichment if interested.

Year 12 Disability Provisions

During Term 1 our school will be applying to NESA for Disability Provision concessions in the Higher School Certificate Exams. A small group of Year 12 students have already commenced the application process, which involves academic testing, supplying specialist medical reports and collating teacher recommendations. Please call Mrs Brown if you believe your student may be eligible for these provisions, such as a reader, writer, rest breaks, extra time or small group separate supervision.

Individual Education Plans

In Term 4 2019, the Learning Enrichment Team visited the feeder campuses to create Individual Education Plans for students identified as needing additional support. These IEP's were also written for a number of students coming from the non-feeder schools. The adjustments made in these plans have been instrumental in providing Year 11 with personalised learning. These plans have been sent home in a sealed envelope with students and we would ask that they be returned to school signed by parents. Forms can be returned to the front office and will be filed as a record of parent consultation.

Wellbeing Report

It has been a busy start to the term, our large wellbeing team which includes learnings support staff, Year Advisors, social workers and Aboriginal Education Workers have commented on the number of Year 11 students who are effectively engaging with our wellbeing resources.

Life Ready has begun for 2020, many students enquire what life ready is: it is a mandatory 25-hour course delivered over Year 11 and 12. It is designed to prepare and support senior students as they encounter situations related to health and safety as they become more independent and gain responsibilities. It focuses on offering opportunities for students to build the functional knowledge and skills for life post school. At TLSC - TEC life ready is delivered each week on a Monday, format of the sessions varies throughout the year depending on the nature of the content. Life Ready activities this term have included:

Year 12

Managing stress, procrastination and anxiety.



Careers Focus - Years 11 and 12 Term 1

Year 11: Year 11 students should be focused on settling into their HSC courses and developing <u>positive study habits</u> at school and home. Some adjustment is required to the home routine, as the study load at senior level requires a minimum of 1.5 hours of homework each night. Students need to find the balance between their commitments to school, work, sport and friends to ensure their <u>studies remain their priority</u>. All students are encouraged to take up this opportunity to gain personalised assistance. Good planning and preparation will assist Year 12 students to make a SMOOTH TRANSITION into employment or further study next year.
