


1. Higher School Certificate testamur



WHAT IS THE ATAR AND HOW IS IT CALCULATED?

- An ATAR is a rank, NOT a number, between 0.00 and 99.5 and indicates a student's position relative to all the students who started high school with them in Year 7
- So an ATAR of 80.00 means that you are 20% from the top of your Year 7 group, not your Year 12 group
- The average ATAR is usually around 70.00 (if everyone from Year 7 went on to get an ATAR the average ATAR would be 50.00.



WHAT IS THE ATAR AND HOW IS IT CALCULATED?

- Based on a student's best 10 units (2 units must be English).
- Universities calculate the cut-off ATAR for each course based on demand.

Depending on the achievement of units of competency, the possible qualification outcome is. Certificate II Construction Pathways CPC20220 or a Statement of Attainment towards Certificate II Construction Pathways CPC20220.

Schools may schedule examinations in preparation for the HSC exam. These do not form part of the RTO assessment requirements.

The assessment components in this course are competency based. This means that students need to demonstrate that they have gained and can apply the specific knowledge and skills of each unit of competency. Competency assessment is graded as "not yet competent" or "competent". In some cases other descriptive words may be used leading up to "competent". A course mark is not allocated.

ELIGIBILITY FOR THE YEAR 11 HSC COURSE

To be eligible for the award of the Year 11 HSC and progress into the Year 12 HSC year, students must:

- Have satisfactorily completed courses which comprise the pattern of study required by NESA 6
 courses/12 units, including English, in Year 11.
- Make a genuine attempt at assessment tasks which contribute in excess of 50% of the available marks in each of the courses undertaken.
- Sit for and make a serious attempt at examinations.
- Attend all scheduled lessons. TEC, in accordance with Department of Education guidelines, expects a minimum attendance record of 90% or above.

SATISFACTORY COMPLETION OF A COURSE

A student will have satisfactorily completed a course if, in the Principal's view, there is sufficient evidence that the student has:

- Followed the course developed or endorsed by NESA.
- Applied himself or herself with diligence and sustained effort to ALL of the set tasks and experiences
 provided in the course, including classwork, assessments, projects, revision, homework and compulsory
 excursions.
- Achieved some or all of the course outcomes.
- Made a genuine attempt at assessment tasks which contribute in excess of 50% of the available marks in
 each of the courses undertaken. It is emphasised that completion of assessment tasks worth exactly 50%
 is not sufficient; tasks worth in excess of 50% must be attempted. Furthermore, the student must fulfil
 the course completion criteria and make a genuine attempt to complete the course requirements. It is a
 matter for the teacher's professional judgement to determine whether a student has made a genuine
 attempt to complete the requirements. Just completing the Multiple Choice Section of an examination is
 not considered as making a serious attempt.

PHONE POLICY



TLSC The Entrance Campus Student Mobile Phone Use

Students may not use mobile phones and connected devices during class time Unless directed by a teacher for the purpose of a learning activity.

Phones are to be 'off and away' in their school bag during class time

This rule extends to all school excursions, assemblies, detentions and other events at the school or offsite, where an approved school activity takes place, unless otherwise advised.

1st OFFENCE

Student has their phone out of their bag during class time

Phone locked away until end of day

Student complies

- Student to place their phone into the TEC Mobile Phone Breach envelope and deliver to DP to be locked in phone safe.
- · Parent/Carer notified via SMS.
- Student may collect phone from DP at 2pm.

2nd OFFENCE

Student has their phone out of their bag during class time

Phone locked away Parent/Carer to collect Formal Caution Suspension Student complies

- Student to place their phone into the TEC Mobile Phone Breach envelope and deliver to DP to be locked in phone safe.
- DP contacts Parent/Carer to negotiate phone pick up.
- Formal Caution to Suspend issued.

3rd OFFENCE

Student has their phone out of their bag during class time

Student Suspended

- $\bullet \ \ {\it Student Suspended for Misuse of Technology/Continued Disobedience}.$
- · Returning from Suspension Suspension Resolution may include:
 - · Phone to remain at home, or
 - Phone to be locked away before the start of school day.
- If Return from Suspension requirements are not met, the Behaviour and Discipline Policy will be continued which could result in further Suspension/Expulsion.


If a student does not comply with instructions, the DP will implement the Behaviour and Discipline Policy.

From 2020, students need to demonstrate a minimum literacy and numeracy standard to be eligible for the HSC



There will be multiple opportunities to pass online reading, writing and numeracy tests before and after the HSC



Early identification and support for students most at risk of not achieving the minimum standard is available under the NSW Literacy and Numeracy Strategy



Students with Band 8 or above Year 9 NAPLAN results in reading, writing and numeracy will not need to sit the online tests



Some students, including those studying Life Skills courses, will not need to meet the minimum standard to be awarded the HSC


